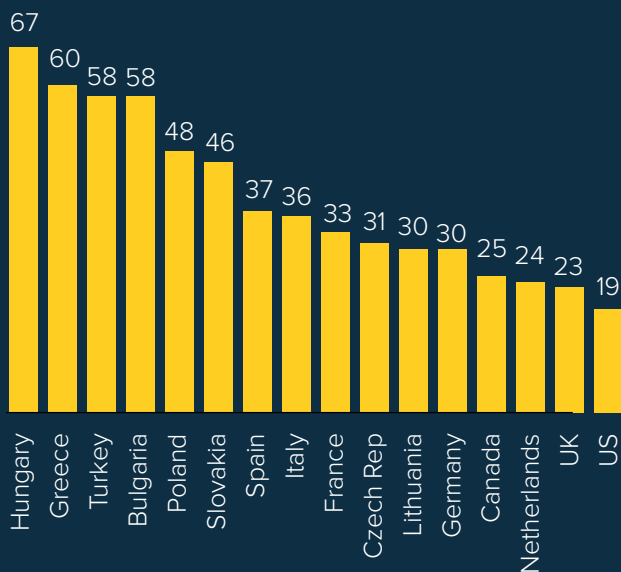


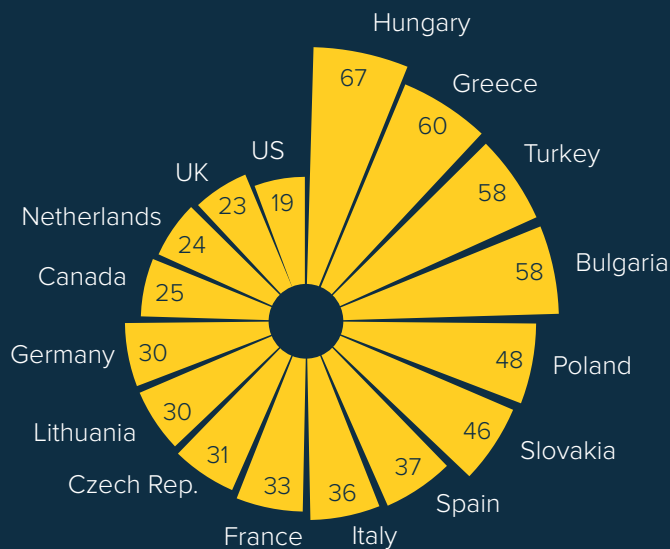

Percentage who believe that parts of neighbouring countries 'really belong to us' (among NATO members, 2020)

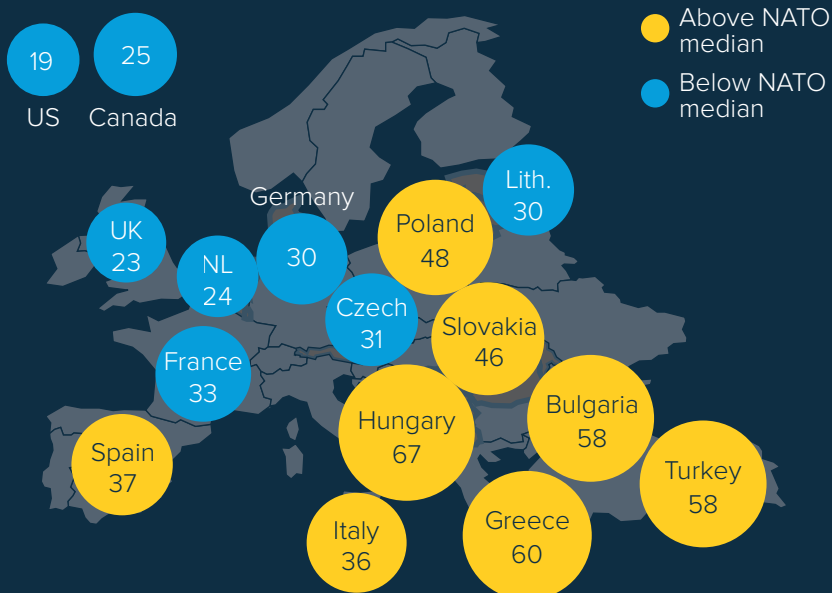

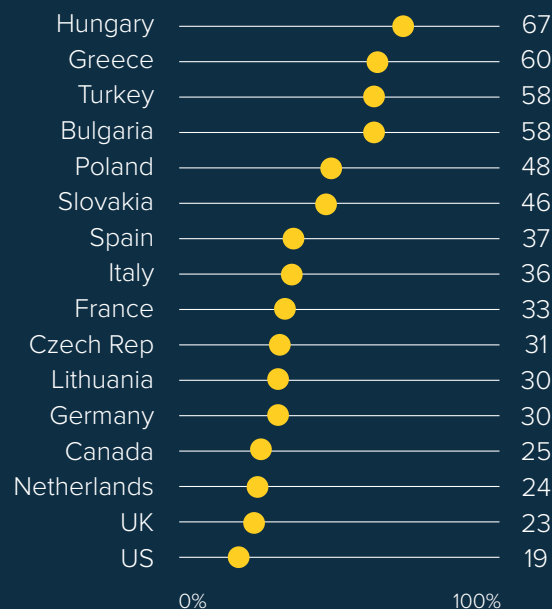
Polar area

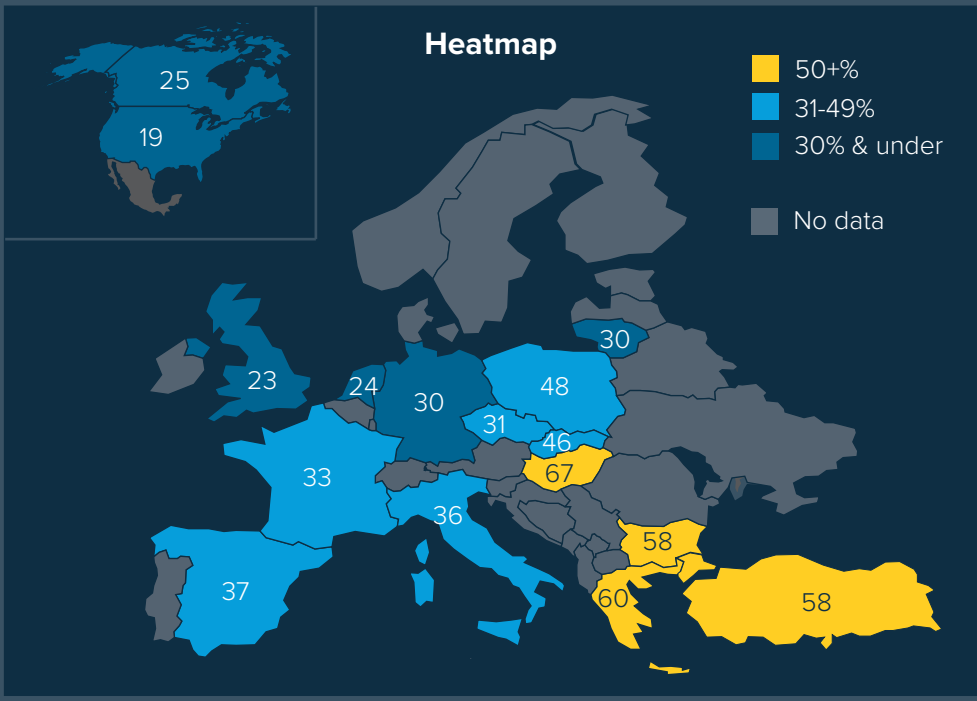


Bubble map



Dot / Abacus chart

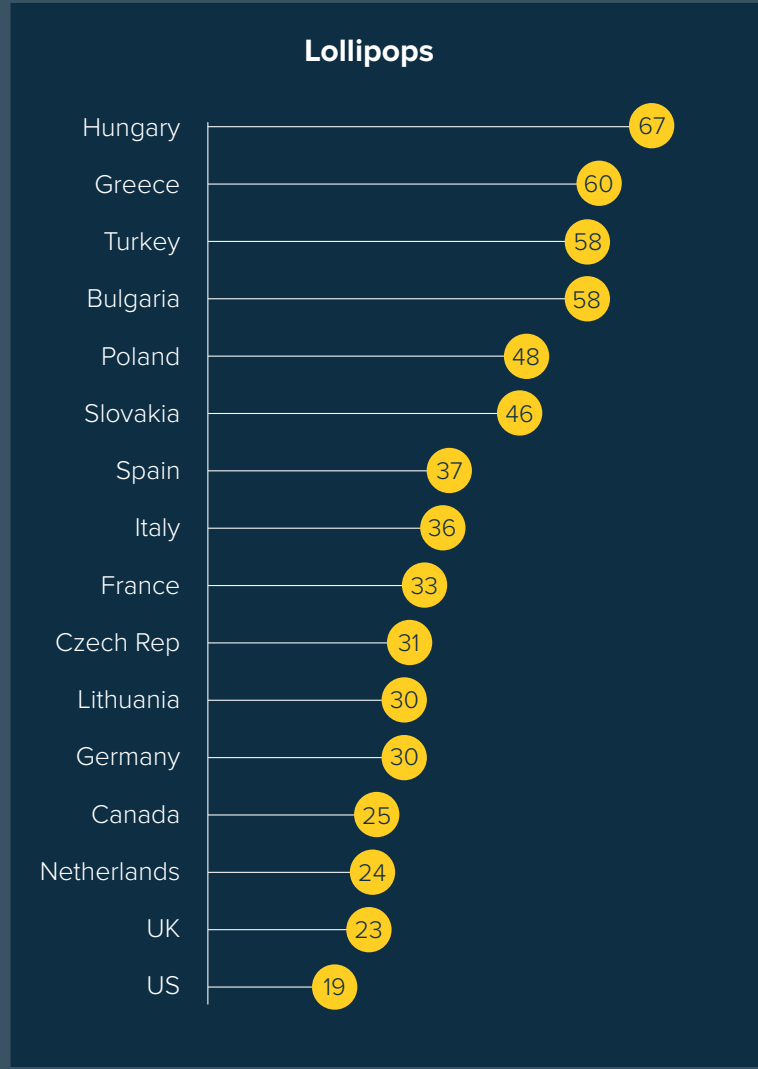
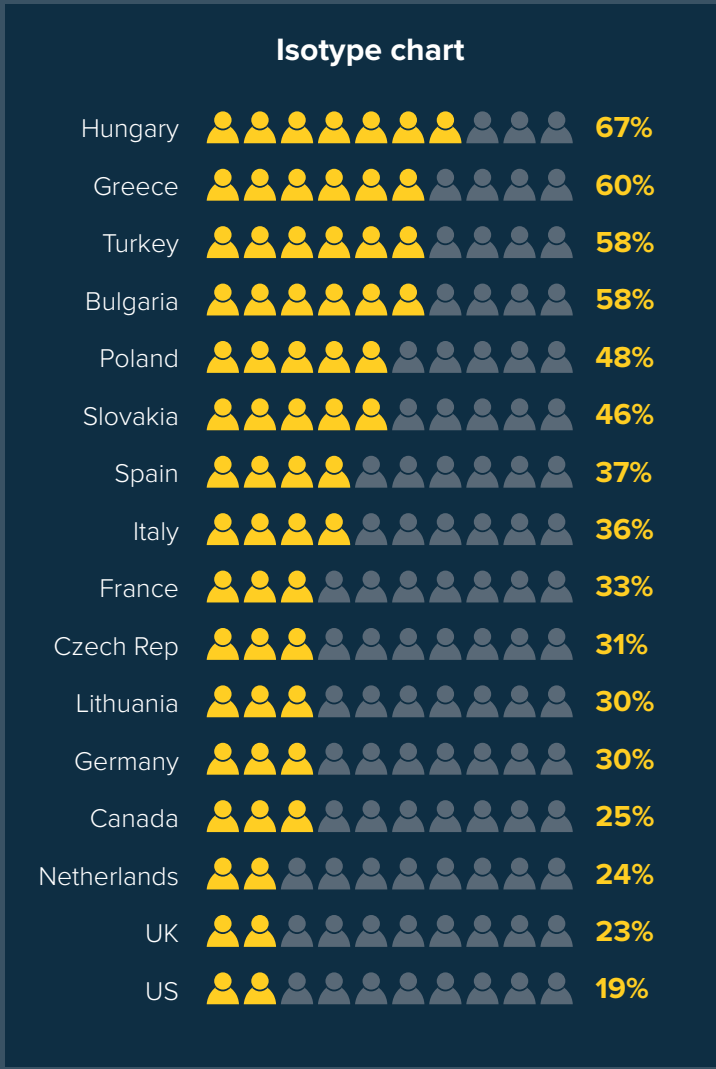

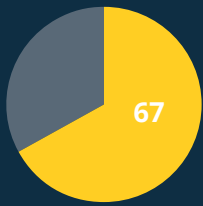

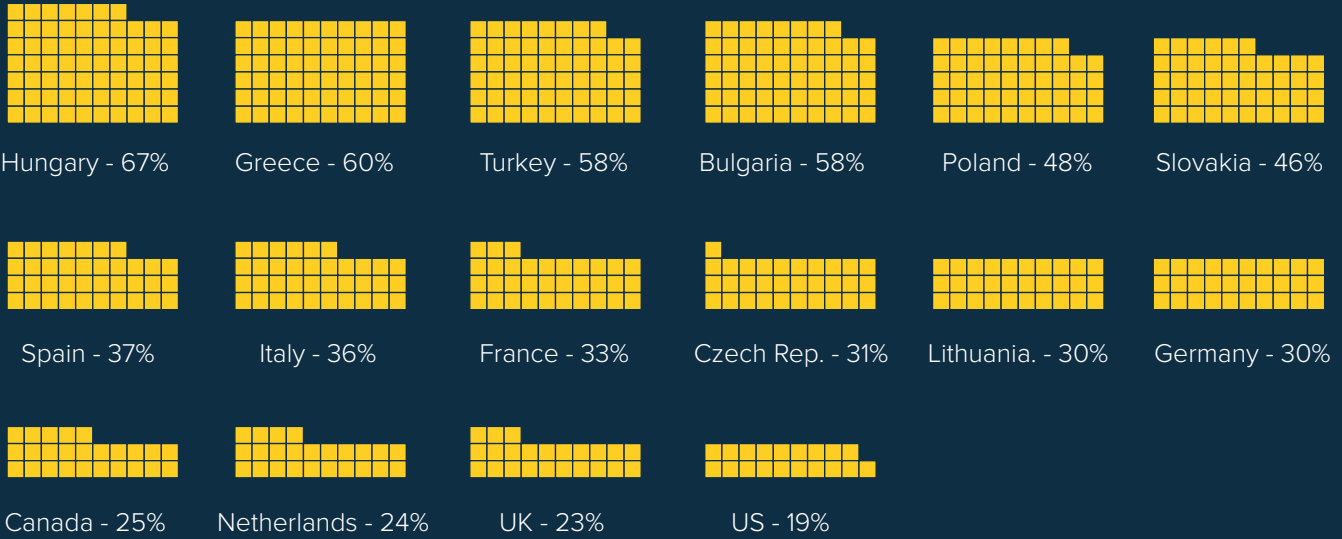

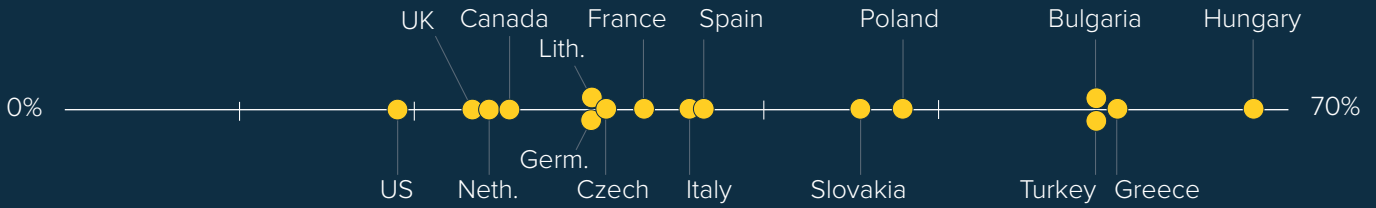

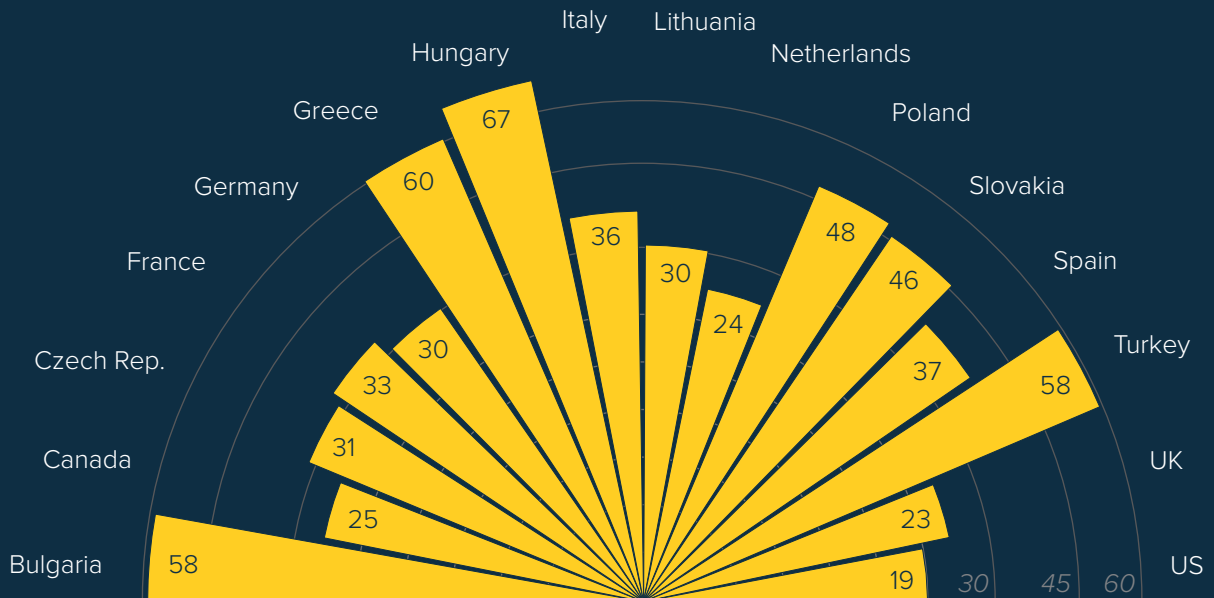

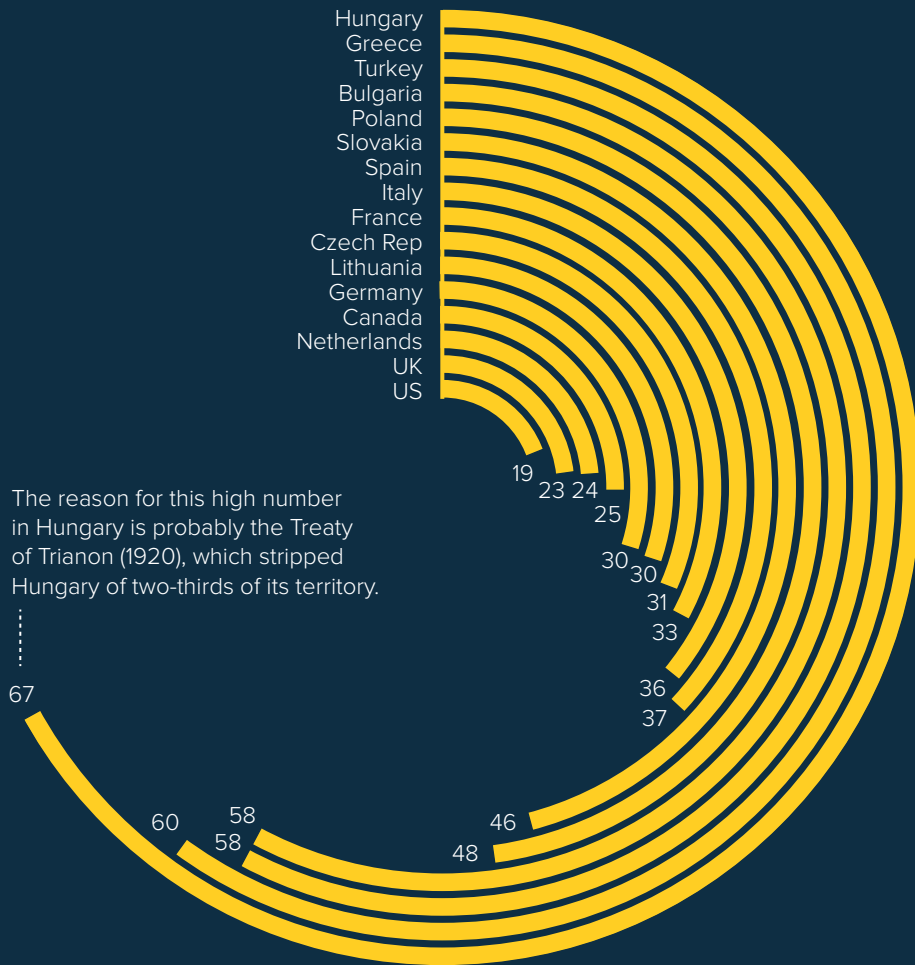

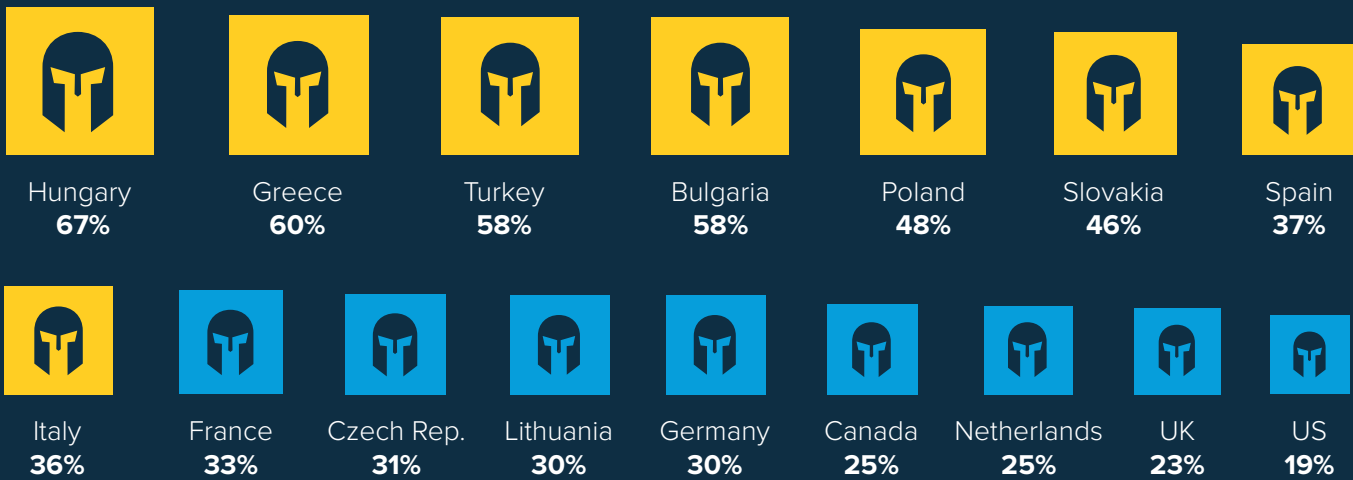
## Sized icons (elongated)

## Sized icons (by area)

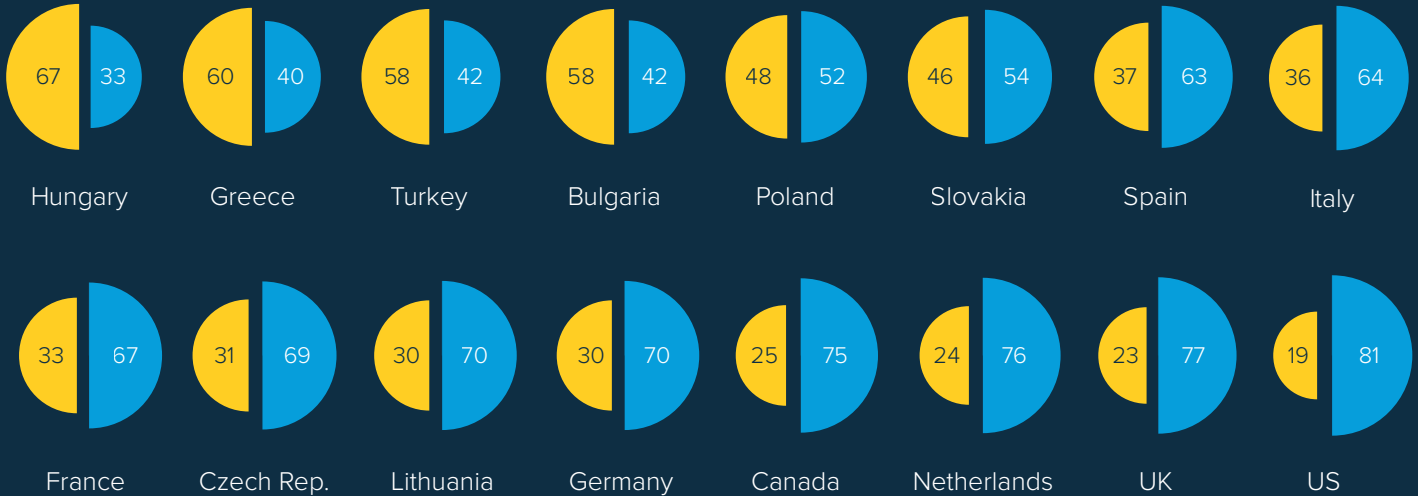
● Above NATO median ● Below NATO median



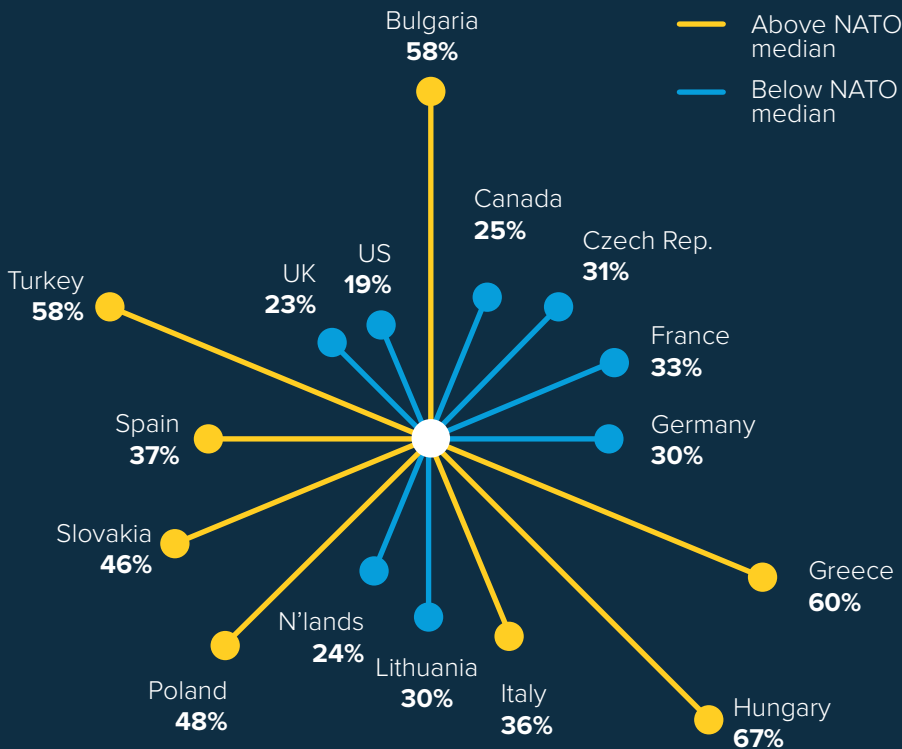

## Words

One hundred years of hurt have left their mark on the Hungarian psyche. The Treaty of Trianon (1920) stripped Hungary of two-thirds of its territory. Today, 67% of Hungarians still say that parts of neighbouring countries belong to them, the highest figure among NATO countries.

Similar sentiments are expressed in Greece (60%) and Turkey (58%), also former Empires that have dwindled in size. Greece and Turkey both lay claim to Cyprus, currently divided between them. The Turkish Empire shrank by over 80% after the First World War.

In western countries, people seem happier with their current borders, with only a third of people in France and 23% of people in the UK saying parts of other countries belong to them.
